Circle True or False or leave blank. (1 point for correct answer, -1 for incorrect answer, 0 if left blank)

1. True **FALSE** To count the number of bitstrings with 3 0's and 5 1's we use $P(8, 3)$ for the number of ways to place the 0's because the order of the 0 and 1 matters.

Solution: Swapping two 0's does not change the bitstring so we should use $C(8, 3)$ not $P(8, 3)$.

2. True **FALSE** When we are dealing with multiple pigeons and boxes, we can use pigeonhole principle to prove that every box must have at least one pigeon in it.

Solution: Pigeonhole principle can only tell us about what happens in one box.

3. (10 points) For this problem, we want to line up 5 males and 7 females in a line.
(a) (4 points) Prove that there must be at least 2 females that line up next to each other.

Solution: First place the males and then boxes be the spaces between them and on the sides. Therefore, there are 6 boxes. We put the 7 females in them and pigeonhole principle tells them that there must be a box with at least $7/6 \approx 1.16$ females, so a box with at least 2 females. This means that in this box, these 2 females are going to line up next to each other.

- (b) (2 points) Is it possible to line them up so that more than 2 females line up next to each other? If so, how?

Solution: We can have all of them line up next to each other like FFFFFFFM-MMMM.

- (c) (4 points) How many ways are there to line them up if we only care about the order of males and females (the males/females are indistinguishable).

Solution: There are $C(12, 5)$ ways to pick locations for the girls and order doesn't matter because the females are indistinguishable. Once we chose the location for the females, the location of the males is determined. Thus, the answer is just $\binom{12}{5}$.
